### **Overview of the Program**

- Many children receiving free and reduced-price meals through the School Breakfast and National School Lunch Program are at greater risk of hunger during the summer.
- Lack of nutrition during the summer makes students more likely to fall behind during the school year and experience health issues.
- Federal Summer Nutrition Programs reimburse meal sponsors for serving free, healthy meals to children and teens ages 18 and younger in low-income areas during the summer.
- Meals can be served at a variety of types of locations and generally need to be to be eaten on-site in a group setting, which is referred to as congregate feeding.
- Recent policy changes allowed the NC Department of Public Instruction to approve sponsors to provide non-congregate meal service in certain rural communities. Eight school district sponsors were approved to serve non-congregate meals in North Carolina.

## North Carolina Program Highlights

**175 sponsors** administered the program

Sites served meals between **1 and 60 days** with an average of **22 days.** 



**Breakfast:** 1,436,843 **Lunch:** 2,250,429

**Supper:** 30,058

**Snack:** 191,196



2,492 sites servedfree summer meals.50 served non-congregate meals

**3,908,526 total meals** were served during the Summer of 2023.









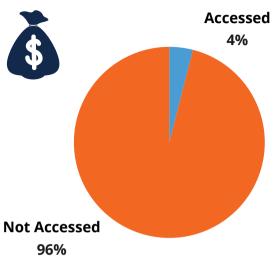

#### Summer Nutrition Builds the Economy!

- Up to two meals or snacks are reimbursable at each site daily, and can be served seven days a week.
- If every student eligible for free and reduced-price meals received breakfast and lunch Monday-Friday (55 days) during the summer, \$ 425,598,024 would have been brought into the state.
- In the summer of 2023, \$ 15,359,390 was brought into the state with \$410,238,634 not accessed.



### NEED

- In September 2023, **1,012,515** children (**70%** of public school students in the state) were eligible for free and reduced-price school meals
- **597,695** students participated in free and reduced-price school lunch in September 2023
